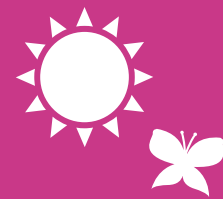


HOW TO DRESS FOR OUTDOOR SUMMER PLAY



Dress for the weather!

Being dressed for the weather is the first step to enjoying the outdoors (for both children and adults).

REMEMBER

In summer, layer clothing that would be easy to remove on warm days or put back on when it becomes cooler and include the following:

For daily play, sports drinks are not recommended.
Water should be the first choice before, during and after play.



Stay indoors or play in the shade between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m.
when the sun's rays are highest, or if the UV index is 3 or greater.

OUTDOOR PLAY CLOTHES SHOULD

1

Be appropriate for the weather.

2

Include footwear that provides adequate support for running and climbing (e.g., gym/running shoes). No flip-flops, fancy shoes or shoes with slippery soles.

Allow for easy movement (not too loose and not too tight).

4

Stand up to wear and tear. No jewelry, "dress clothes" or special clothing that are not allowed to get dirty.
